EDITORIAL

This month saw some new regulations come into force.

SPLIT HEIGHT COMPETITION. For classes where there are 15 or more dogs. This has already seen both split and non-split classes, some on the same day even!! Certainly has created some extra interest and it is easy to see that some of the mini handlers are putting even more effort in as a win is a good possibility. Also being part of a smaller maxi brigade has been interesting—lining up behind some tall Dobermans etc has made Tana seem quite small!!

TYRE. The tyre is now faulted if the dog knocks it apart—I had to fault one dog at Horowhenua, it basically demolished the whole obstacle including uprooting some very long pegs, so no problem faulting that one!!

LONG JUMP. The long jump is shorter for all heights of dog—the meant I had to pull out the rule book and my tape measure as the existing club sticks are no longer correct and I couldn't remember all the new numbers—600,800,1100, 1600mm maximums.

CHANGES TO ELEMENTARY. This means that handlers can now progress from Elementary B to Elementary A, and B has a 6 pole weave.

25 CLEAR ROUNDS AND JUMPERS C GRADUATION. In addition people need to be counting their clear round certificates for Jumpers because once you have 25 Grade C crcs you have the JD title and are out of Jumpers C! Once you get 25 Jumpers B crcs then you also gain the JDX title, but you also need a further two wins to get into Grade A,

Top Ärf Report—by Kim Orlando-Reep.

I'm always having moments of weakness and agreeing to do things I sometimes later regret - and then wondering why I never have any spare time.....so having agreed to take over the historical Zone 1 report from Ann, it seems that now is crunch time and I have to crank up my brain and see what I can recall of last month's happenings on the agility scene.

First a bit about me. I've been involved with agility for 15 years, first with WAG as an instructor and committee member (honing my literary skills as newsletter editor) and now defected to Counties where I don't do anything useful other than turn up and try to look intelligent. I manage the livestock on our beef farm and compete with an assortment of mainly homebred dogs with the Relko prefix. Although I'm primarily a breeder and therefore obliged to breed show, my main hobby is agility and I compete most weekends north of Taupo. I've bred working Border Collies for well over 30 years and Ridgebacks slightly less. Recently I seem to be collecting whippets. My current most consistent dog is a whippet called Isis.

Another previous moment of weakness which found me on the Whippet Club committee also led to me being rather miffed to discover that the Whippet Club 30 year anniversary weekend clashed with Akarana Triple Jumpers - but as that weekend also saw the end of the dry weather, I was not quite so sorry when I saw the state of the grounds and some of the competitors from the warm, dry interior of the NZKC building at Ardmore. It was strange to be so near to a ribbon trial and not be competing but I'm hoping that Nigel Kenny will be able to contribute some useful information as I heard his plaintive voice shrieking "Hudson" on a couple of occasions.

North Shore, who held a Triple Jumpers the following Sunday, has something of a reputation for providing extreme weather conditions – and the lead up to their ribbon trial was not promising. It was so wet that the Flygility competition due to be held the previous day was cancelled so as not to damage the grounds and parking was at a premium. This was the first time I had been to a competition since the new rules came into effect. Pre-entry helped to relieve the pressure on the organisers as did selecting your chosen places on the running orders pinned on the walls. It all ran smoothly and finished in good time, but there is obviously a lot more clerical work involved in all areas especially working out the results.

On a personal note, I found it hard work running 3 dogs at different levels and different heights. I have run up to 6 maxi dogs in the past without a problem, but here with relatively small numbers and split heights I had 3 back to back runs and missed out on walking one of the courses because there just wasn't the time to fit it in. I was quite glad that my 4th dog was at home in season. With 2 midi dogs and 2 maxis in B & C jumpers in different rings there are going to be clashes, but it may not be so tricky with standard events and more competitors. It was also strange to be one of only 6 clear rounds overall in B jumpers with a midi dog and not get a ribbon, whereas dogs competing at a different height received ribbons with faults. Having been against the rules changes, but going with the flow, I'm still in "Let's give it a go" mode – and will see how it works out over a few months.

The last weekend of the month revealed my third moment of weakness – agreeing to do the Pet Expo for the Ridgeback Association when I had vowed after the last one that I'd never do it again. But back in January it was a long way off...it might not have been so stressful had I not entered in the 4 open breed shows as well...but in yet another moment of weakness I decided that I really should support the local clubs with some entries. However, the point of all this ramble is to congratulate WAG, and especially Joanne Small, for organising and putting together an excellent stand and agility display over the two days at very short notice. It was a great advertisement for our sport and I heard many positive comments.

Down South report—by Elaine Pearce

The only event for the month of July was the Otago Canine Training Clubs triple indoor event on 24/25th July. This was the South Islands first event under the new heights and the first split classes. Each of the three Novice's just reached the split requirements with 15 or 16 in micro/mini.

We ordered split ribbons for both Novice and Intermediate as well as unsplit ribbons for both. We did not need them for Intermediate but no doubt will in the future. It may be that we have wasted our money ordering the unsplit Novice ribbons but really did not have a choice. It is too late to order ribbons (from our supplier anyway) once the entries close.

Establishing the correct heights for the dogs was also a mission. Some people did not have their dogs measured until the last possible moment, some entered the wrong height because they forgot and for some dogs we needed to wait for a decision from the AC for those dogs to run a higher height than they had measured for. In the end with various peoples help we got there and everyone ended up in their right heights.

Three dogs (I think) won out of classes due to the splits (two mini's and one maxi) some in my humble opinion ready and some not. None of the three would have

won the unsplit Novice. Time will tell whether they hack it in the higher classes. There is always the option for handlers just to enter the lower classes for which they are eligible for a while but if you are just running one dog that fairly much deters you from travelling unless the club offers jumpers classes as well. I do think there will be dogs winning into Seniors who will not manage the sorts of courses you see in Seniors.

My dog for one. He is big and long and would probably find the Senior courses physically too hard. However saying that the two mini dogs who won out will probably be fine. We will just have to wait and see.

Congratulations to Saffy and Nina Arps for winning Top Starters dog and Top Overall dog. Also nice to see Keri Neilson down although a few hours in A & E did mean she was not running at her best. Even so she still managed to win Senior 3. Hope you are feeling better now Keri.

Thanks also to our judges Nick Chester and Paul Taylor. Very easy going judges to work with and nice challenging courses which were perfectly doable for the level. You will both be invited back :-)))

Video Review

Foundation Training for Agility by Moe Strenfel by Darryl Jewiss

This is a 3 DVD set with more than 3 hours of video.

TRAINING SPOT.

Welcome to NALA's Agility Training spot. This will feature some reprints and some new articles. Please feel free to write in with your own comments, suggestions and requests for topics.

FOUNDATION TRAINING.

Before your puppy sees any agility equipment you should ensure you are on the right track as far as the basics are concerned. This means:

Socialisation/habituation.

Does your dog interact with other dogs, animals and people in an acceptable manner, even strangers? Agility dogs will see a variety of strange dogs and people in often stressful situations such as start/finish lines where there is a lot of milling around, and he needs to be able to cope with that and still focus on you and the job at hand. He needs to enjoy going to new places without wanting to run off and explore without you! You need to let your puppy meet as many different people and other dogs as possible, and ensure the association is enjoyable. You need to take him out with you and experience lots of new places, and walk on lots of different surfaces, so that he will be able to cope when taken indoors on slippery surfaces, or outdoors when it is wet and muddy, or hot and the ground is hard.

Training techniques.

You need to use positive training techniques as these encourage the dog to try things without worrying that he might be wrong. Punishment causes a suppression in behaviour, which is the last thing that you want with an agility dog that has to traverse a variety of equipment laid out in a variety of patterns, at speed and often at some distance from the handler. They need to be happy to "give it a go" and perhaps get it wrong, and then recover and try again! I recommend using the clicker, with the rewards being toys and food.

Agility, when to start?

Handling and basics such as waits—as soon as possible.

Jumps and weaves at 10-12mths. Beware jumping low jumps for too long!

Contacts start with on the ground training as soon as possible including running over low ramps.

General Activities.

Playing and tugging are VERY important. Run with me also. A mix of con-

trol and crazy with the Ready-Go game. For agility dogs to be successful it is very important that they are able to perform certain basic behaviours well. These form the foundation of any dog sport and include stationary behaviours and active behaviours. Attention, sit, down, recalls, run with me, figure of eight and crosses.

TARGETING.

Targeting is a very useful behaviour to train the dog, as it can be used in many ways eg. to teach “come”, to place the dog in different areas by where the target is. Eg. Facilitate send-away or go-outs, for Contact training, where the target is placed at the bottom of the ramp and the dog targets with its nose.

HAND TARGETING.

To start: prepare everything: the space, the target mat, the clicker, the treats, the dog and you! Suddenly make the target mat (piece of carpet, icecream lid etc) “appear”. The dog will either flick its ear, move its eyes, move its head etc in the general direction of the target. BE READY to catch this with the clicker and reward. Hide the target and make it “appear” again. Click as above.

You should notice that the dog becomes able to

- Turn its head
- Stretch its neck, move towards the mat
- Jump up to the mat
- Crouch down to the mat etc. as time goes on and as they become aware of what is required.

Hard presses. We are looking for the dog to really press their nose against the mat rather than just wipe the nose over it or close to it. You can click the actual touches vs the “slidebys”, and also by closing your eyes you will be able to FEEL the hard presses.

Equipment .

The equipment is really the easy part about teaching agility, it is what goes on between the equipment that will determine a good round or a great one.

Tunnels can be introduced early but ensure you add control over them such as waits, find the entry, left and right turns afterwards and run around and avoid doing the tunnel. You don't want a dog that dives in the tunnel at any opportunity.

Ramps can be part of the progression from targets or boxes to the real thing. A raised ramp will ensure confidence is developed in a pup not used to heights.

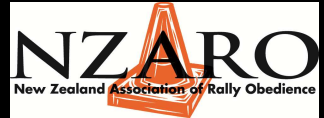
Weaving and Jumps can come later when the pup's muscles are well developed and progress can be made quickly.

You can start on lanes with a young pup which teaches fast weaving and entry from anywhere but the two-by-two method can teach 12 POLES IN 12 DAYS IF YOU HAVE THE GEAR AND THE TIME!!

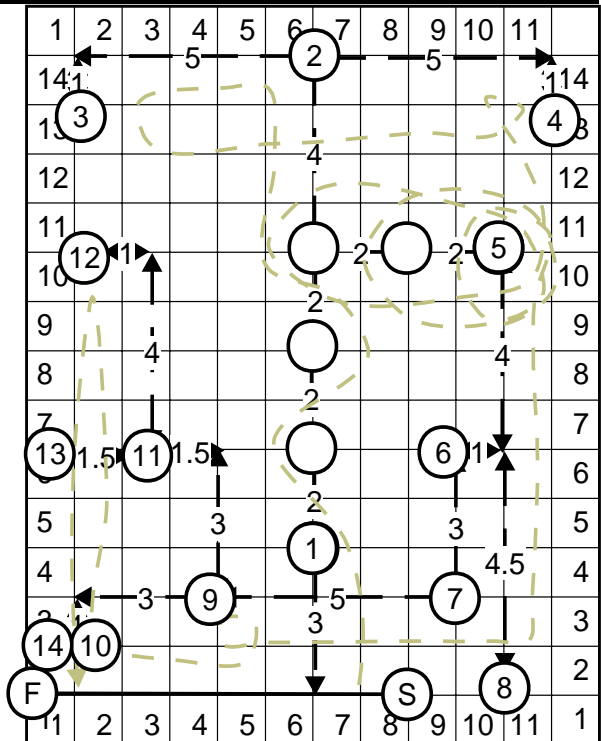

Flygility.. by Allan Rohde

When I start training a new dog to do flygility I will start with the flyball jump and flyball box. I will spend quite a bit of time on this and there are three main reasons for this. They are:

- To teach the dog to trigger the box and catch the ball.

- To teach the dog to turn quickly

- To condition the dog to always look for the flyball jump

By keeping this simple (1 jump & box) you can get in quite a few repetitions before the dog gets tired. And as with agility, repetitions is the best way to get the dog to fully understand what is required of them.

The benefits of spending time at this stage can be seen at tournaments. Dogs will mis-catch the ball at times and those that have been taught well will always look for that flyball jump even when the ball has gone several metres off line. Other dogs will just collect the ball and head straight back.

To condition the dog to always look for the flyball jump, I simple get them to do the box and then run back over the flyball jump. A reward is always given when completed.. As the dog gets reliable at this you can start putting the flyball jump off-centre to the box or you can get a helper to throw the ball to the side at the point the dog triggers the box. For the later exercise, the handler may initially have to help the dog to line up the flyball jump.

To achieve the faster turns, this comes by encouraging the dog to return to the flyball box as soon as it catches the ball. A good reward at the end of the exercise is important in achieving this. If the dog hesitates at the box after catching the ball then you need to “encourage” the dog to come back quicker. If the reward is not motivation enough (and it usually is), then you can leave a lead on and give the dog a gentle tug to get them to come back.

A turn where the dog does not go past the box is much quicker than if the dog jumps/runs past the box as it is getting the ball. To stop the dog getting into this bad habit, you can keep a lead on and only allow the dog enough slack to get to the box. Alternatively, someone can stand immediately behind the box which will generally cause the dog to check itself as it approaches, I have found this particular behaviour is very difficult to stop if it gets establish so it is better to prevent right from the start.
