GAME - GAMBLERS

Points Accumulation Period (PAP) The dog starts at the start obstacle and completes obstacles as desired until the whistle sounds (after 30 secs) . Each obstacle correctly negotiated within the PAP earns that number of points. The dog may negotiate any obstacle from any direction but can only score each obstacle twice. Obstacles may not be taken back to back except if the dog misses a contact when it can be directed to redo the obstacle immediately to score it. Knocked poles and missed contacts will not be scored. Poles are not replaced during the round so that when a pole is knocked that jump is not worth any points should it be negotiated later in the run. (If you knock poles in the gamble during PAP they will not be scored in the Gamble). Refusals are not judged in either the Points Accumulation Period or during the Gamble.

Gamble.

Following the whistle at the end of the PAP, the handler must direct the dog to attempt the gamble. A further 10 seconds is allowed for this. Note: the handler may not enter the hatched area marked on the map. When a mistake is made or time is up, scoring of the gamble ceases. Whatever obstacle the dog is doing when the 10 seconds is up can be scored.

Gamble:-First obstacle: 2 pt, Second obstacle:4 pts, Third obstacle: 6 pts. (Total points for gamble completed = 12. Time is taken till the point at which dog clears the last gamble obstacle and will be somewhere between 30-40 seconds.

Total score = points gained/time taken.

Flygility.. by Allan Rohde

One of the things I have noted starting to creep into tournaments over recent times is the number of incidences where a dog decides to chase the other dog rather than stay in its own lane. This is nothing new but the number of times it happens appears to be increasing and this could eventually lead to a situation that is not too pretty. Often this situation arises with a new dog that has not experienced another dog running in a lane next to them. It is all new and exciting and the temptation to chase the other dog just becomes too much for the dog to control. This particular issue can be alleviated to a large extent if the dog is introduced to the competition situation (ie two lanes) at training. This way the dog gets used to another dog running next to it before it experiences it at competition level. At training you can also control the situation thereby controlling the dogs actions. There are many different ways of controlling the situation. Some examples of this are making the lanes further apart to start with to lessen the attraction of the other dog, either delaying the release or releasing early at the start so the dogs are not immediately against each other, or having people strategically placed between the lanes to stop the dog crossing over.. Ultimately you need to stop the behaviour before it becomes a habit.

Unfortunately, sometimes these methods do not work and the dog still prefers to chase the other dog instead of running the course. In a lot of cases these dogs are the ones that like chasing other dogs in other situations as well (agility, playing etc). And often this can be put down to the way the dog has been brought up as a pup. Whenever we are asked to help in this situation one of the first question we ask is “was the dog allowed to free run with other dogs in the household?” Almost in all cases the answer is “Yes”. What usually happens where this is allowed to happen is that the dog finds the other dogs more exciting than the handler because that is where they have always got their enjoyment. This issue has usually developed over a long period so is not always easy to correct but there are ways to certainly make the situation better. One method that seems to work well is to teach the dog to

focus on the handler rather than the other dogs. You do this by first limiting the amount of free running with other dogs. You then work on focus exercises and games with the dog with plenty of rewards for when the dog responds to these. Over time the dog will shift its focus from the other dogs to the handler because that is where it will receive its rewards. When running the dogs they should come back as soon as they are called. If they do not respond and continue to chase the other dogs, then they go on lead. If they do come back then they get plenty of rewards. The dog has to earn its free play with the other dogs and it does that by coming back immediately it is called even when playing with the other dogs..

Most of what I described above we have experienced with our own dogs. In our early days with flygility we had one dog in particular that chased the other dogs and at the time we did not have the answers to change this behaviour. It had been allowed to free run with two other dogs. We eventually stopped doing flygility tournaments with her. This leads me to my next comment which is, if you are finding your dog chasing the other dog at tournaments then you need to consider removing the dog from that situation until you have it under control. A new dog may cross lanes a few times but they should stop this reasonably quickly. If they are still doing this after 3-4 tournaments then you need to consider what you are achieving by continuing on. At this point the dog is simply developing an undesirable behaviour that the longer it goes on the harder it will be to change. The best thing here would be to remove the dog from the situation (stop competing) and work on exercises to control that behaviour. Once this is achieved then go back to competing. It is a difficult decision to make but if you consider the long term benefits it is a decision well worth making.

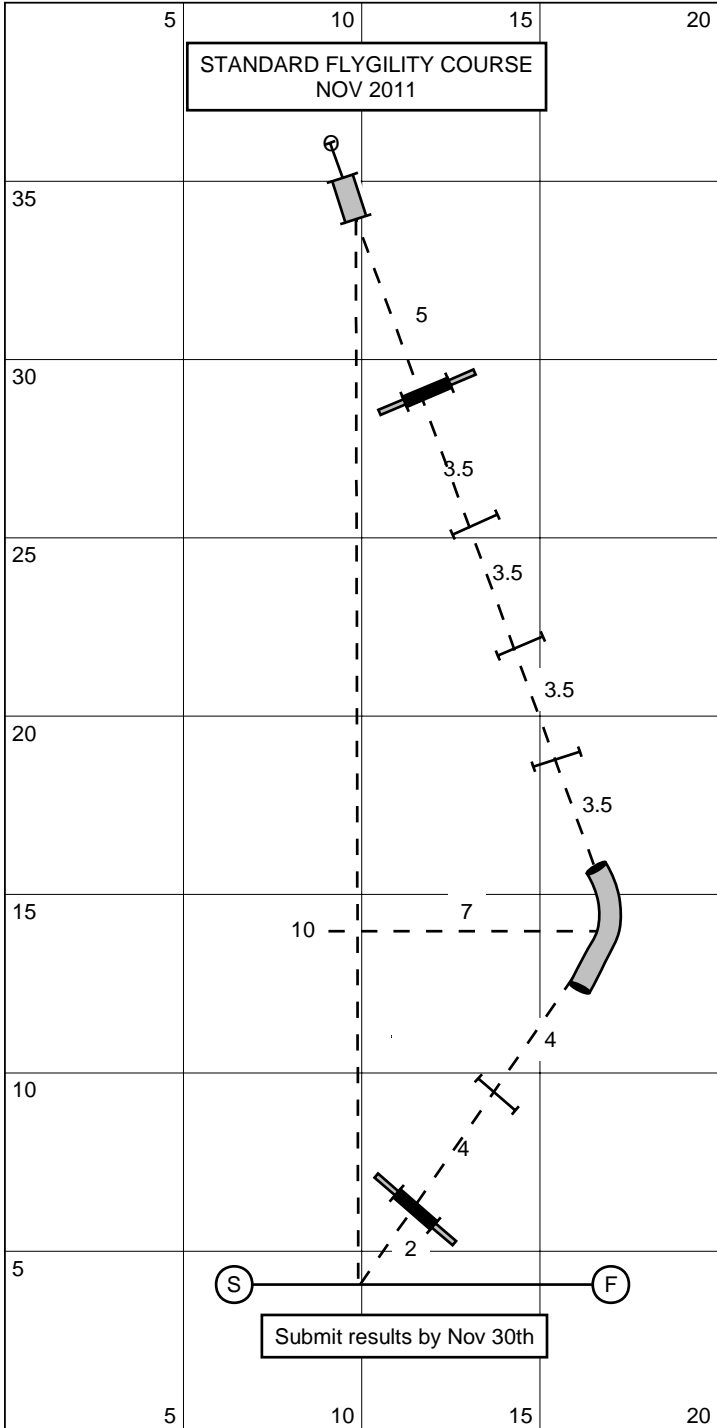
